Friends and Neighbours: Newcastle

Township in the County of Durham. Like many other settlements along the north shore of Lake Ontario, it began as two settlements. The inland settlement was started as an inn/tavern complex at a crossroads a few miles back from the lake shore. It was called Crandall's Corners after the inn keeper who first opened a tavern in 1835. In 1839, a harborcommunity called Port Bond Head was founded on a small harbor at the lake. In 1851 the two communities, only a few miles apart, were amalgamated as the Village of Newcastle. The last name was borrowed from a famous town in England (literally the new castle). The village was located on the

pioneer Danforth Road and the

arrival of the Grand Trunk Railway in 1856 further cemented the village as a local centre for farmers in the area. Inland villages such as Hampton, Orono, Kirby and other smaller settlements to the north funneled their business through Newcastle. The little port also became the outlet for the inland townships of Manvers and Cartwright. The area was famous for its flour and numerous grist ing into Lake Ontario from the Oak Ridges Moraine. In the mid-1800s, several large Newcastle. A large woolen mill served the farmers in the area. Northrop and Lyman opened a large patent medicine factory; but most importantly Daniel Massey, a local farmer, started a famous foundry in the village. As a young removed. Newcastle is located in Darlington USA where he was impressed with American farm machinery. He returned home and began a foundry (1847) in the village of Newcastle. The first machines were assembled using American parts, but soon the Massey Machinery company was turning out Canadian farm machinery for the local market. With increasing demand, the Newcastle business soon expanded to 11 acres and grew by leaps and bounds. In fact it soon outgrew the village of Newcastle, and in 1879 Hart Massey moved the factory to Toronto. It quickly became Toronto's largest industry and Massey machinery dominated the Canadian market. Sir John A Macdonald brought in the National Policy in 1879, placing large tariffs on the American farm machinery giants such as McCormick and John Deere, leaving the expanding Canadian market wide open for the Massey Company. In 1891, it merged with the A Harris Company to create Massey-Harris. When tractors came along, the company produced the famous Massey-Ferguson tractor line. By 1900, the Massey-Harris Farm Machinery Company was the largest machinery company in the British Empire. The company bought out companies in the USA, Australia, mills operated on the creeks drain- Italy. Spain and Argentina to become a true multi-national operation. In fact, since 1962 Massey-Ferguson Tractors were the bestindustries opened in the village of selling tractors in the world. 

With the loss of its major factories in the late 1800s, the town of Newcastle began a decline. The population fell from 1,500 to less than 1,000. It still served as a farm centre for local products such as apples. Algoma Orchards, one of the largest apple producers in Canada, has its headquarters in Newcastle. Ivy Alberta Gilmour, by Janice Stange

Ivy Alberta Gilmour was born on June 15 1893 to Albert and Elizabeth Gilmour. She was likely given the middle name of Alberta for her father, Albert. She experienced the births and deaths of 3 of her siblings and the death of her father before she reached the age of 5. When her father died, Ivy, her mother and her older sister, Myrtle, were left alone. After Albert's passing, Elizabeth, Ivy's mom, took the train to Lindsay to learn tailoring and dressmaking, which she turned into a thriving business and was able to send Ivy to the Peterborough Normal School in 1912, and to buy a house in 1915.

Ivy attended the Kinmount School until 1908, until age 15. She began her teaching career in 1911 after graduating from Continuation School in Lindsay. At the time, she would have a temporary (3rd class) teaching certificate. After two years teaching at Miner's Bay and Irondale, she attended Peterborough Normal School to acquire a 2nd class teaching certificate. After graduation, her teaching career was off and running. Between 1913 and 1962 Ivy taught at the following schools: 1913-1920 SS #3 Somerville (Kinmount)

1922 – Bobcaygeon

1922 – Jan – April Kinmount

1922 – April – June Cameron

1922 – 1935 – Fenelon Falls

1935 – 1936 – Kinmount

1936 – 1938 – Fenelon Falls 1938-1962 – Kinmount

According to her record, she was in Lindsay for 3 years, she then taught in 2 schools before she went to the Peterborough Normal School in 1912/1913. She returned to teach at Kinmount for 7 years, then taught at a few other schools, before returning to finish her career in Kinmount in 1962. That's more than 50 years of teaching, with 33 years teaching Kinmount kids!

Ivy was a well-loved teacher and was referred to as 'a kind

and patient friend' in a thankyou letter from students at Fell's School in 1935. They gifted her with a serving tray, as a token of their esteem.

She was involved in many organizations in Kinmount, serving her community tirelessly. For many years she was secretary for the Kinmount Fair. This earned her recognition in the form of the 'Coronation Medal 1953', which was presented to worthy community members. As was common for teachers in this era, Ivy never married. She was committed to her career and followed the protocol. She taught until she fell ill in December 1962, and she passed away on September 29 1963. She is buried with her sister Myrtle and Myrtle's husband David Pollard in the Kinmount Cemetery.

The house (4983 Monck Rd. Kinmount) that Ivy's mother bought in 1915, and that Ivy lived in for 48 years is being restored by family and was designated historical in 2008.

Three Brother's Falls

The mighty Burnt River cuts a large swath through the geography of Kinmount and also through the folklore of the area. One of the sites worth seeing on the River is the Three Brothers Falls, located a few miles upstream (north) of the village. Here the Burnt River tumbles over 3 distinct ledges of rock. Just above the Falls, the 3 branches of the Burnt River join into the main river. The Drag River drains the area around Haliburton Village, Kashagawigamog Lake and up to its headwaters at Drag Lake. The Centre or Burnt branch comes out of Koshlong Lake. The Irondale branch drains the southern part of Haliburton County starting from Farquhar Lake above Wilberforce. After amalgamating, the combined waters boil over the Three Brothers Falls on their way to Cameron Lake and the Trent River system.

The Falls have always been an attraction. The earliest legends mention a story about an Indian princess, who denied her choice

of husbands by her father, plunged over the Falls in a canoe, never to be seen again. Her ghost is said to haunt the Falls.

The river drivers found the Falls challenging as their log drives were tossed by the three obstacles. It was observed that 3 lonely graves on the northwest shore marked the spot where 3 unlucky river drivers took their last rest. This was not a big number of graves, by Haliburton standards. Other waterfalls boasted larger cemeteries!

The earliest surveyor allowed 200 acres on the south shore of the Burnt River as a mill reserve. Despite the promise of unlimited water power, no record exists of any water powered sawmill at the Falls. It was rather isolated from a main road, and better sites were plentiful in the area. But as a tourist spot, the Falls were famous. Numerous early photographs were taken at the site. This article features photos of an outing to Three Brothers Falls circa 1900-1914. Tourists likely came by canoe as several shots were from the water. But they did bring their camera along to record the event for posteri-



Some ore was removed and carted to IB and O Railway where it was brought to Kinmount and shipped south to smelters in the United States. The quantity of ore didn't allow the corporation to be profitable. They were closed by 1890.

Note: Numerous smaller mines existed in the area. The Howland Mine was the largest.



Happy Thanksgiving! May you be fortunate enough to spend time with family and friends.

Roast Chicken with Bread Stuffing and Gravy - 6 servings

Stuffing

2 tbsp butter

1 small onion, chopped

1 rib celery, chopped

4 cups stale bread cubes

1/2 tsp dried sage or poultry seasoning

1/2 cup milk

1/2 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp pepper

1 3 lb (1.5 kg) chicken

Gravy

1/3 cup water

2 tbsp butter

3 tbsp flour

3/4 cups juice from chicken or stock

3/4 cup milk

salt and pepper to taste

To make stuffing, heat butter in a small skillet. Add onion and celery. Cook 3-4 mins. Combine with bread cubes. Add sage, milk, salt and pepper. Cool mixture. Spoon stuffing loosely into the cavity of the chicken. (If there is any extra, bake separately in a baking dish covered in foil). Place chicken, breast side up, in a roasting pan. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Roast, uncovered, in a preheated 350F oven for 1 1/2 hours or until thoroughly cooked. Baste chicken every 20 mins. with pan juices. Remove chicken from pan. Remove stuffing from chicken. Keep warm separately. For the gravy, add water to pan and scrape off any bits from the bottom. Reserve juices. Melt butter in a small saucepan. Stir in flour. Cook 3-4 min. until lightly browned. Whisk in reserved juices or stock and milk. Bring to a boil. Cook approx 5 min. until mixture thickens. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Slice chicken to serve.

Mashed Potatoes with Garlic

4 Yukon Gold or Russet potatoes (about 2 lb), peeled

6 garlic cloves, peeled

1/4 cup skim milk

1/2cup nonfat sour cream

1 tsp olive oil

1/2 tsp salt

Cut potatoes into 1 1/2" cubes. Place potatoes and garlic in medium saucepan; add enough water to cover. Bring to a boil. Cover for 10-15 mins or until potatoes are tender. Drain: mash with potato masher until smooth. In small saucepan, heat milk over medium heat for 1-2 minutes or until not. Add milk, sour cream, oil and salt to potatoes; mix well.
